Minutes of General Meeting, Thursday, March 14th, 2024

Welcome all and Land Acknowledgement announced by Louise S.

Report of Officers

<u>Programming</u> - Louise advises that we are still looking for someone to head up the programming. Thanks to Advocacy Group we do have a speaker for the September meeting.

<u>Treasurer</u> - Erica advises that not much has changed and the current balance is \$5883.36.

Membership - Donna advises that we are still at 33 paid members.

<u>Scholarships</u> - Dorothy advises that some of the schools have given her some dates. Louise mentions that since Dorothy has been doing the Scholarship Officer position for such a long time, there will be an executive meeting to discuss new officers as necessary.

<u>Fundraising</u> - Louise Z is spearheading the High Tea and Art fundraiser. Had a productive meeting with lots of volunteers to fill in spaces to help out. The service and switchover will go much smoother this year. Louise S has the tickets available at \$50 per ticket. Louise received an invitation to the Scarborough club's high tea which is only \$25 for 2 hrs at a church without the painting aspect. Our event will be Saturday May 11th.

Advocacy - Marci away so Carolyn advises that there is a UN Commission on the Status of Women being discussed. CFUW National sent 20 people to the conference. If you ever want to go, please apply earlier in the year. The conference theme they'll be discussing is accelerating the achievement of women, addressing poverty and financial strengthening with the gender perspective. CFUW position is that education is the key out of poverty. They are hosting a parallel event with speakers arranged so that others at the conference will be able to attend. The UN says Poverty is someone who makes less than \$2.15 a day. In 2020, over 3,000,000 people are in that category, mostly native Canadians. First Nations children are most likely to be living in poverty.

Advocacy Group is looking at the Resolutions for the next meeting. There's lots of viewing available for the event online. Louise announces that we will be having a potluck, with an early start of 6:30 rather than 7pm. For those who are new to the club, the resolutions are an annual presentation that is discussed by the clubs around the country. These resolutions will be discussed at the next meeting, and members will decide which resolutions we agree for Louise S to take to the AGM. If the resolutions are accepted at the AGM, we will look at how we can advocate for those causes. Two of the resolutions are about Long Term Care, if you are interested in that area, and aging in place.

Every month the group discusses various groups in the community that are doing good works. Caroline, Erica and Janet went and supported The Refuge in Oshawa, who work with homeless people. They went out on the Coldest Night of the Year and raised \$200 for their cause. They are planning to attend again next year.

This meeting, we are supporting the Scientists in School, which was initiated by women in this club. This perfectly suits the CFUW theme of 'Education is the key out of poverty', especially with girls in Science education. Cindy talks about the programme. 1989 started by Erica and Nancy Williams and now at the 35th year. It provides confidence in STEM. The small group grew to reach 700,000 students pre-covid. It has been a charity since year 10. The revenue model is a charitable organization with 20% of annual funds from corporations and community foundations, with 80% by user fees. Covid was a major setback. Once they started back, the programme was online, with each student getting their own package of materials for the workshop. They have 40 topics for in-person and 40 topics for online learning. Online has opened up the programme to rural and indigenous students. A sample kit for the electricity workshop

includes copper tape, light bulbs and resistors, with the circuit drawings to teach them the concept of electricity. Help promote the programme, as some districts may not know about them.

Their first workshop in the Yukon is in a couple of weeks and Cindy is very excited about that development. Presenter recruitment is difficult as they have dropped off with the pandemic. If you or someone you know is interested in being a presenter, in person or online, contact Scientists in School. A big surprise to Cindy was the excitement of the kids getting their own materials and how they wanted to show the family at home what they learned in the workshop. Summer workshops will be done in the community, in childcare centres, in boys and girls groups. An easy way to help promote Scientists in School is to follow their Facebook page and Share when there is some programme that is of interest.

Ontario Council, as per the latest newsletter that Louise S sent out, is running a speaker series on Food and Food Insecurity that you can sign up to attend.

Carmen discussed a situation in her neighbourhood, down by the lake, where she observed the turtles come out to lay eggs out on the road, near Lake Driveway Carruthers Pavilion. She wanted to know if there were easy ways to get the turtles protected. She wanted to contact her town rep to get some sign or other notice. Some of the suggestions were to get material to surround the area in a fence or boxes such as Conservation Area Lynde Park uses. If there are Blandings Turtles, the Toronto Zoo has a program where they rescue turtle eggs and have them hatch along the Rouge River on the zoo property. Suggestions to call turtle watch groups, rescues or Naturalist groups or Conservation areas may be able to help bring a solution to the site. Gail L has some potential sources which she will forward to Carmen who can then include all the group to get involved in contacting these sources for assistance.

Resolutions have just been sent by email and Louise S asks if there are any that are of particular interest to you. Please contact Louise or Caroline to let them know that you would like to delve into the area. Louise will be going to the National AGM in Edmonton in July. Anyone else interested in attending the Ontario AGM in Windsor or the National at Edmonton, please let Louise know.

Gail advises that her community group will be supporting the Food Bank by standing and giving out leaflets with their required foods, at various groceries in the area. Cash donations can be made on their website. They prefer cash donations so that they can get the required foods at cost. No pasta please.


