Minutes of General Meeting, Thursday, November 14th, 2024

Welcome to all members, and visitors, Janine & Susan. Land Acknowledgement by Louise S. Cathy and Claudette seconded last meeting's notes.

We are still waiting for the city's approval of the room grant.

Louise advised that on Nov. 30th the Ontario Council will have its Speakers Series about Affordable housing and human rights. Sign up directly online.

Report of Officers

<u>Membership</u> – Donna is away. Per Erica, there are 32 members including Janine.

<u>Treasurer</u> - Erica advised we have a healthy budget and current bank balance is \$7383.63. Erica mentioned that there was a very good fundraising effort led by Kim G for a total of \$660.59 for the scholarship fund, as well as \$240 donated to the scholarship fund from the membership fees since we are no longer participating in the National Council program.

<u>Scholarship</u> - Dorothy has retired from this position after 36 years. New coordinator for this role, Helen, gave a review of the scholarship program for the benefit of our newest members. Here follows some of her review's major points: Since 1988 the Ajax-Pickering chapter of CFUW has been granting scholarships to women graduates from local high schools to help them pursue a university education. The club awards scholarships to graduating Grade 12 female students in each of the nine high schools in Ajax and Pickering. The value of the scholarships is determined annually by the club and for 2025 will be \$300 per student. The scholarships' recipients are selected by the schools based on criteria set by the club. The scholarships are funded through yearly fundraising activities of the club, donations from members and the community, and a small portion of the members' annual dues, approximately \$7.00 per member. The current scholarship bank balance is \$4355.66 which includes the \$660 profit from the recent VanderMeer Nursery fundraiser. Investments include \$6473.31 locked-in G.I.C. at 4.25% with BMO maturing August 26, 2025, as well as three \$1000 cashable G.I.C.s for one-year terms with BMO maturing October 16, 2025. Adding our cash in the bank and the investments, the scholarship total assets are \$13,828.29.

<u>Advocacy</u> - Caroline advises that the last meeting, 1st Wed of the month, was held by Zoom. They did go on a field trip to listen to a panel discussion on Sustainability. December 6th is a remembrance for the Massacre of the Montreal university students. In addition, the Horizon House will recognize the women and children in Ontario who were killed by domestic violence, showcasing them by photos and presenting a bit of their lives. This year the free event will take place at Ajax Community Centre, possibly the Admiral's Room, but Caroline will advise to confirm the room.

<u>Communications</u> - Janet has no further news other than getting the club to be included in the Town's registry of clubs available in the area.

<u>Social</u> - Louise Z thanks Jane and Dorothy for the treats. January had a spot left for a volunteer to bring in treats. Gail offered to bring in something.

Interest Groups

<u>Book Club</u> - Carmen not in attendance. Louise advises that the meeting will be at Andrea's home discussing the book, The Hostage by Clare Mackintosh.

<u>Walking Group</u> - Jane advises that on Wednesdays, they will be walking and it's not necessary for you to advise her unless you may need to confirm that you'll be a bit late arriving at the designated starting point as instructed in her weekly email.

<u>Card Group</u> - Cathy says the group uses the Trickster app along with Zoom for social discussion. Let her know and she'll provide specifics.

<u>Lunch Group</u> - Catherine not in attendance. Louise advised that regular third Thursday meeting was planned to be in the Distillery District but there may be concerns about the Taylor Swift concert and delays to

transportation services. To be determined whether Catherine can secure reservations.

<u>Travel Group</u> - May 21st, 2025 cruise is still on the books.

<u>Craft Club</u> - first Tuesday of the month will be at Louise's house and working on preparations for the spring tea event.

Holiday potluck will be at Louise S's home at 6:30, 2nd Thursday of December, the 12th. She requests that we carpool as much as possible, as parking space is limited. Those with mobility issues can contact Louise for instructions to enter the house rather than using the front stairs that may be daunting, without railings. Please bring \$10 with you to be donated to the local Food Bank. We will be doing a Blind Auction where you will bid on wrapped items with play money that you'll be given in place of your \$10 donation. Some good prizes and some zonks. :) Any other suggestions for activities are welcome.

Speaker: Clarence Keesman, Executive Director of The Refuge, a Christian organization, at Albert & Olive Streets, with approximately 15 full time staff and many volunteers. They work with homeless young people and are currently renovating a building to accommodate people. They may not be addicts, but perhaps recent immigrants or teens that have left their home for various reasons. Additionally, Holy Cross High School in Oshawa will have 26 units with private bathrooms and kitchens, and a common area, with couches and chairs as well as an oven.

The Refuge has many programs available to the youths, like their breakfast and lunch meals, Friday nights where meals are served, provide help with accessing housing, access to clothing, sports programs, music programs, etc. Approximately 92% of their clients have experienced abuse of some sort. There have been some success stories like the drug addict whose heart had to be assisted by EMT, who then went on to become a father at a young age, became an addiction counsellor and got full custody of his son, who was born with no addictions or complications.

The number of youth served by The Refuge from Jan.1st to Oct. 31 was 454 unique individuals which is an increase of 25% from last year and 54% increase from 2022. Total interactions with youths in 2024 throughout all their programs was 11,902, a 49% increase from last year, and 79% increase from 2022. Durham Region has a By-Name List so that the homeless whose needs suit the services that The Refuge is able to provide will be directed to the Refuge.

Rat Park, in Vancouver was used as a laboratory by a UBC Professor, studying caged isolated rats with little to do but were provided with morphine-laced water. The rats would drink the water and eventually died. In the Rat Park, rats were provided with the same morphine-laced water but they started to reject the morphine water as there were other rats to commune with and other sources of amusements and food. Like rats, humans are social creatures and need to feel as though they are in a community where they belong.

Homeless youth are looking for community and would like for people to smile, greet them & inquire what they need, not assume that they're addicts or dangerous. The Refuge does not give up on people, so clients shouldn't give up on themselves.



December Thoughts

On December 6th we will honour our promise to never forget them and remember the young women who lost their lives at the Montreal Polytechnic on December 6th, 1989. Sadly, violence against women, especially domestically, has in the years since that horrific event, increased in many societies. This is true both nationally and internationally. As members of CFUW, we have both a responsibility and opportunity to do all that we can to help eradicate what has not always been accorded the seriousness it demands. We can lobby governments on all levels to address the issue of violence against women through legislation, public education, research and ongoing campaigns. We can teach our daughters and granddaughters what is acceptable in a relationship and what is not. And, we can lobby our politicians to fund resources as needed to provide women caught in situations of domestic violence with the means and support to safely leave the situation.

Domestic violence is complicated, with many factors leading to what are often tragic outcomes. Research into its causes and impact on families, especially those with children, needs to be seen as a priority in terms of the wellbeing of our society and as such, funded accordingly.

However, the reality of violence against women is unfortunately a global issue. We obviously cannot intervene in many countries around the world but we can bear witness to the victims of such violence. We will never know the names of those women around the world who will die from violence being directed to them or who are threatened with violence should they not comply with the societal norms of their communities. However, we can make sure the women of Afghanistan, Sudan, the Middle East and so many other countries are not forgotten just as we will never forget the 14 young women who died on December 6th, 1989 at the Montreal Polytechnic.

Advocacy Group


